"It is God's work that is being done in South Sudan," he said. "And it is God who will see it through to completion."


Brothers Festus and Bernard extend deep gratitude for financial support that has provided a motorbike for quick local transportation.

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Pope Francis Visits Congo & South Sudan



It was a moment our Brothers in Congo would never forget. On the morning of January 28, they joined pilgrims from the Archdiocese of Lubumbashi, and traveled to Kinshasa for the arrival of Pope Francis. Brothers François Musongo, Ghislain Mukonkole, and Vital-André Mwenge set out with the support of General Superior, Brother Daniel Skala, and the blessing of the Congregation.

Pope Francis' apostolic journey to Congo and South Sudan began in Kinshasa, Congo, with an itinerary consisting ofmeetings government officials and diplomats, an outdoor Mass, gatherings with catechists and young people as well as consecrated religious and Three ecclesial meetings bishops. organized during the visit of the Holy Father, in particular the mass celebrated at NDOLO Airport, a meeting with young people at Martyrs Stadium, and a prayer assembly with priests, consecrated persons, and seminarians in Notre-Dame du Congo Cathedral. Brothers were present at each event.

During the Holy Mass, Pope Francis edified Catholics in their faith in Christ. He assured them that God, who hears the cries of the suffering, will provide comfort. Among the young people, the Pope emphasized their place as the future of the country and to take up their position in building a better Congo. He called them to fight against antivalues, among which he focused on corruption, encouraging youth to be honest. Brother Ghislain, with fellow diocesan youth chaplains, was attentive to the Pope's address and relayed the message among the young people of Kilwa-Kasenga.

A meditation on the five luminous mysteries preceded the Pope's entry into the Cathedral. This prayer of the rosary was led by representatives of the Conference of Major Superiors of the different ecclesiastical provinces of Congo. The Brothers' province of Lubumbashi, represented by Reverend Sister Astrid Mand, SDS, Vice President and Brother Vital-André Mwenge, received the charge of leading the fifth mystery. The Brothers sang the prayer and song while Pope Francis made his procession into the cathedral.

"My impression was thanksgiving and gratitude," stated Brother Vital. "Experiencing such an event so closely was historic and gratifying. Indeed, to be in front of the Pope, less than five meters away, for an hour, was something to give thanks to God. The various messages from the Holy Father revealed to us our condition as sinners, our limits in the experience of our consecration, and therefore, a call to conversion."

"We also want to thank our Brothers, near and far, who have supported us during this pilgrimage, whose graces go to the whole Xaverian family," said Brother Vital.

Pope Francis continued his journey to Juba, South Sudan, where he was joined by the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Church of Scotland Moderator for a 'pilgrimage of peace' that highlighted reconciliation and forgiveness after the civil wars in the country. Our Brothers in South Sudan are hopeful companions as they work for reconciliation.

In the wake of the Pope's visit to the two countries, people seemed hopeful that the Pontiff's words and deeds inspired genuine change.

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XBSS: Called to Something More



Dr. Ben Horgan, XBSS Formation Director and Saint John's High School alum addressed the students.

"Nothing special is achieved without much labor, effort, and zeal," he stated, quoting the Fundamental Principles of the Xaverian Brothers. "Xaverian spirituality, finding God in the common, ordinary, unspectacular flow of everyday life... these words directly relate to our founder, Theodore James Ryken. He was common, he was ordinary, and despite that, look, we're all here today in this room."

Ben went on to share the meek and mighty ways God uses people, and how He responds to humble hearts.

"You're all here for a reason," he assured the students. "God wanted you to be in this place with your peers from Xaverian schools across the country."

Inclusion, belonging, diversity, and service were all themes explored during the retreat while a variety of cultures, backgrounds, and life experiences were represented by attendees. Edification, encouragement, and building each other up was central to each day.

"The groups really started to come together," stated one student. "It's so incredible to meet students from so many different states, and I'm just really grateful for that experience."

All 13 XBSS schools were challenged to think about how they could creatively serve the marginalized and forgotten in their respective communities by using their specific God-given gifts, talents, passions, and interests.

"Many of you might underestimate the influence that you have in your communities," said Dr. Patrick Slattery, XBSS Executive Director, to a crowd of students.

"You have a lot of folks that think quite highly of you. When you have that many people seeing something in you, that want to awaken that greatness and potential in you, that's God speaking to you. There will be moments when God gives you great opportunity to step up and use that leadership. You're called to something more; to do more, to give more, to give that gift that you have as a gift to others."

Patrick emphasized how retreats often lead to decisions and asked the students how they could help lead by going back to their schools and communities to pour out what's been poured into them.







The retreat forged and sharpened servant leaders from across the school network and lit a fire in the hearts of students to return to their communities, empower others, promote justice, serve the marginalized, live as agents of God's love, and lead the way for lasting change.

In Haiti, Hope Prevails Amid Dire Conditions

Despite an endless myriad of challenges and upheaval in Haiti, the Sant Zavereyen community had the honor and joy of attending a graduation ceremony for one of their students. Livenson, who joined the Sant community in 2018, graduated from the University of Saint Francis of Assisi with a degree in Administrative Sciences. Perseverance and hard work paid off in the end, even amid a society plagued with instability, high living costs, and armed gangs patrolling the streets. Universities struggled to maintain normalcy, but Livenson kept his focus and didn't let anything move him as he pursued his goal and finished strong.

"As Nelson Mandela said, 'Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world,'" said Brother Adolph. Continued support helps students in their university studies so they can help change their communities.

Brothers Adolph and Vincent have acted as mentors and parents to their students. Even though the socio-political reality of Haiti is in turmoil, they have not stopped accompanying their students with love, care, and compassion.

"We are excited for Livenson and we wish him well as he moves onto the next phase of his life," stated Brother Vincent.

"Haiti needs modern day heroes, and the Sant is helping to develop a team of them," said Brother Bill Griffin.

Yvronel Joseph, from the class of 2018, brought his mobile dental team to St. Gabriel's school campus in his hometown of Fontaine, for a four-day clinic. The six-member team offered free or highly discounted dental services to 150 patients, free check-ups, cleanings, fillings, and extractions.



Yvronel hopes to return to Fontaine three or four times a year to follow up with his patients and provide dental health education to students and community members.

Sant students ask for continued prayers as they navigate uncertain times amid political and societal disruption.

"Our students thank you for your support and this thanks comes from the bottom of their hearts because you made this community available to them," said Brother Adolph.

The Brothers continue to help these students achieve their personal and academic goals and have created a new family for desperate young people in challenging circumstances.
