For years the focus of the Ryken Center for Hope has been the rescue, rehabilitation, reintegration and education of the growing number of homeless or "street" children living on the streets of Bungoma, Kenya. A key indicator of the program's success is the increasing number of boys/young men who have been successfully reunited with their families and reintegrated into society.

Not ones to rest on their laurels, the Xaverian Brothers, teachers and administrators at Ryken Center for Hope recently conducted a situation assessment to determine next steps to improve the program and thus the quality of life for its students.

As shared in the Chinese Proverb above, the goal of our program is focused on creating systemic/lasting change in this community by adding a robust vocational training component to the curriculum. We're striving to provide the skills that will allow our graduates to feed themselves for a lifetime not for a day!

Bungoma County officials visited the Center in the fall and met with Mr. Francis Masicha, Co-Director of the Ryken Center for Hope. They were pleased with the progress the center has made since its opening in 2017.

The development of a strategic three-year plan to enhance the vocational training portion of the curriculum is the result of the recent assessment. The launch of this multi-phased initiative will begin May 2025 (with all phases completely integrated by January 2028).

The overall goals of the project:

- Develop vocational training programs that are accredited by the Kenya Ministry of Education.
- Provide professional alternatives for "street" children who are not college bound.
- Provide training opportunities to local young adults in order to improve their socio-economic status.

The Project Intends to:

- Deliver vocational and life skills education to the growing number of Ryken Centre for Hope beneficiaries.
- Offer vocational training to the young adults from within the local community.
- Ensure and improve the socioeconomic situation of the beneficiaries and society at large.
- Develop and deliver vocational training opportunities that meet the current market needs.

Course Offerings Will Include:

- Carpentry and woodwork joinery
- Masonry and bricklaying
- Tailoring/Dress making
- Metal work and fabrication (Welding)
- Shoe making
- Plumbing
- Beauty and hairdressing
- Electric and electrical wiring
- Bee keeping and agri-business
- Bread making and confectionary
- ICT and Computer studies
- Financial accounting

XBSS Administrators and Members Meeting



BROTHER THOMAS P. CULLY, C.F.X. (Brother Russell) 1937-2024

Brother Thomas Cully entered eternal life peacefully on September 2, 2024. Thomas was born in Brooklyn, New York. He was predeceased by his parents, and his brothers Peter and Charles, who was also a Xaverian Brother.

While a student at Brooklyn's Saint Teresa's Elementary School, Tom first met the Xaverian Brothers. He entered the Brothers' formation program at Saint Joseph Juniorate in Peabody, MA in 1952. Upon graduation from the Juniorate in 1956, Tom entered Sacred Heart Novitiate in Fort Monroe, VA where he received the Xaverian habit and religious name, 'Brother Russell.' Brother Tom earned his BA from Catholic University in 1963. He also studied at Columbia University in New York, Gannon, la Universidad Católica of Puerto Rico and Queens College, where he earned certification as a Court Officer and Narcotics Counselor.

He taught briefly at Flaget High School, Louisville, but his first real mission was to the newly opened Nazareth High School in Brooklyn, NY (1963-1972). He

was an excellent Spanish teacher. His creativity, humor, energy and gregarious way engaged the students. He made learning fun. While at Nazareth, Brother Tom, along with other Brothers (Michael Warren, Charlie Reiter, Marty Moran, to name a few) were the first to be involved with the new Student Retreat Program. These Brothers helped expand the program to other Xaverian schools. Brother Tom also taught at Holy Name Elementary School and at Bishop Ford High School from 1972-1992.

Brother Tom would follow a unique path in ministry. From 1992 through 2003, he worked as a Senior Court Clerk and Narcotics Counselor for the New York Department of Corrections. It was non-church related, yet nonetheless a ministry many individuals needed. Again, his characteristic personal qualities, his awareness of people, would allow him to listen, challenge and help those incarcerated, especially Spanish-speakers.

As we remember Brother Tom, we honor his uniqueness and the wonderful impact that he had on so many lives—an impact grounded no doubt in his love of God as it impelled him to embrace life, family, friends and strangers with genuine care.

May Tom enjoy the peace and love that Christ promises all who follow in his footsteps.

BROTHER THOMAS F. RYAN, C.F.X. (Brother Lee) 1948-2024

1962 was an instrumental year in the life of the young **Tom Ryan**. That is the year this son of Thomas F. Ryan and Mildred (Kennedy) Ryan, a child of Bronx, NY, began his high school career at Cardinal Hayes High School on Grand Concourse in New York City.

It was at Cardinal Hayes that he would first meet the Xaverian Brothers and especially the peripatetic Brother Arnold (Brother J. Robert Houlihan). Arnold, among other things, was the moderator of the Camera Club, the ideal extracurricular activity for the introverted Thomas Ryan. It was in Camera Club that Tom came to know the life of service, commitment and availability that was the life of a Xaverian Brother.

Upon graduation from Cardinal Hayes in 1966, Thomas Ryan travelled to Newton Highlands, MA to throw his lot in with the Xaverian Brothers.

After graduating from Catholic University in 1971, Brother Ryan began his teaching career at St. John's High School, Shrewsbury. He taught at St. John's from 1971-1981 and again from 1983-89. It was at St. John's that he came under the tutelage of the redoubtable Brother Ivan, who served as superior of the community. Ivan played an influential role in Brother Tom's commitment to work for the underdog, to notice what was happening in the lives of his students, especially those who thought themselves on the margins. He also interspersed his service at St. John's with two stints at St.

Joseph Regional HS in Montvale, NJ from 1981-83 and again from 1989-92.

In 1992, he reluctantly accepted the offer to serve on the administrative team at Xavier High School, Middletown, CT with the caveat that he could also teach. While administration may have gained him years off purgatory, it was certainly not his love. He loved being a teacher. Brother Ryan would be the model par excellence of the Xaverian values of humility, simplicity, compassion, trust and zeal. Countless alumni from Xavier, St. John's or St. Joseph Regional could speak to his competence as a teacher, and just as many could speak to the way he embodied the Xaverian values and instilled them by example in his students.

Brother Ryan loved teaching, especially English, Social Studies, and Civics. No doubt students who were fortunate to have Brother Ryan as a teacher can still diagram the most compound-complex sentence you can imagine. His favorite past time was trains, watching them, riding them, logging the numbers of the cars he would observe. One excess he allowed himself was a periodic trip to Horseshoe Curve just outside Altoona, PA, one of the engineering marvels of the world. He introduced many a train aficionado to this marvel.

When Brother Ryan wasn't teaching, working in the bookstore, moderating the train club or some other extracurricular, cleaning up after a dance, or attending a student retreat, he was serving the Brothers. His care for elderly and

infirm Brothers was legendary. It was because of his care for the Brothers that he was asked and accepted to serve as Director of the Brothers' retirement community in Danvers, MA. He worked around the clock to make sure the Brothers received quality care. Even the most obstinate of Brothers—and there have been one or two of them—responded with gratitude for whatever Brother Tom would do to ease their suffering.

The life of a teaching Brother, and all that entailed, drew Brother Ryan back to Xavier HS after his term of service at Xaverian House. Xavier was his home, and he was a fixture there at any hour of the day or night. Students, teachers, alumni, parents knew where to find Brother Ryan when they needed something, and he always responded graciously.

Brother Thomas Ryan embodied the call of the Xaverian way of life. He saw the uniqueness in others and fostered it. He brought out the God-given gifts and talents that students never realized they had. He manifested God's care and compassionate love to everyone, with no exception. He allowed himself to be given away, "as nourishment for others, as bread that is broken."

May Brother Thomas now enjoy eternal life and experience God's unconditional and all-embracing love.



BROTHER DANIEL CONAGHAN, C.F.X. (Brother Rian) 1940-2024

Dan was the child of Irish immigrants John Conaghan and Grace Curran Conaghan. He was born in Brooklyn, NY, and first met the Xaverian Brothers as a student at Saint Teresa's parish in Brooklyn. He attended Saint Francis Prep with the Brooklyn Franciscan Brothers. By God's grace, Dan chose to enter the Xaverian Brothers in July 1957. He received his habit and religious name, Brother Rian. For many years he attended St. Teresa parish reunions.

Brother Daniel was a man of faith, strengthened by an abiding spiritual prayer life and consistent humble service through teaching, coaching, tutoring, and patient works of mercy to Brothers, students, family, and friends. Brother Daniel lived and shared the Xaverian charism on three continents, as Brother, classroom teacher, mentor, and friend.

He particularly reached out to the marginalized student-the shy, the struggling, isolated young man who found in Brother Dan a listening and accepting adult presence in every mission he served.

From 1963-1974, at Flaget High School, he served as teacher and coach. As a work in progress, Brother Dan was a quick obedient learner when assigned to coach a struggling wrestling team. Despite his own shyness, Brother Dan moderated many school activities. A neighborhood boy recalls that in the evening, Brother Dan's first floor classroom would slowly fill up with students and neighborhood kids wanting to hang out with this understanding Brother.

When Flaget closed, Brother Daniel accepted an assignment to teach at St. Xavier High School from 1974-1978 as a math teacher and coach. Years later he returned to St. X as volunteer tutor and friend to many students, faculty, and Brothers. 1978-1986, Brother Daniel found his way to Mount St. Joseph High School, Baltimore. He served as a teacher and business manager for the school. Then came the call to foreign mission and Brother Daniel readily answered.

In Bolivia from 1986-1997, besides living and helping in the formation community, Brother Daniel volunteered at several places helping the growing population of 'street kids' in Cochabamba. From 1999-2007, Brother Daniel accepted an assignment to Kenya. When Brother Dan arrived in Lodwar, he fit right in and needed little or no time to find his stride. He taught Math and Computer Science.

In 2008 Brother Daniel returned to Louisville to live at Ryken House and then Treyton Oak Towers. Soon after his return to the U.S. Brother Dan was diagnosed with Parkinson disease. Initially, he embraced it as a challenge he could wrestle with through exercise and lifestyle changes. Eventually memory loss and difficulty swallowing challenged Brother Dan's interactions. He moved to Nazareth Home for care, where he passed away on September 21, 2024.

The Congregation treasures the memory and life of this beloved Xaverian. May he rest in peace.

BROTHER GABRIËL VANDERJEUGT, C.F.X. (Brother Ivo) 1933-2024

Brother Ivo passed away peacefully on Thursday, October 24, 2024, in the company of his Brothers, Adelbert and Johan and caring staff at the Residential Care Center in Herdershove, which has been the home of our Flemish Brothers in recent years.

A native of the village of Hooglede in West Flanders, Gabriël Vanderjeugt entered the Novitiate in Torhout on August 30, 1950, at the age of seventeen. There he received the habit of the Xaverian Brothers and the religious name 'Ivo.' Even after he reverted to his baptismal name Gabriël everyone still called him by his religious name 'Broeder Ivo.' By 1956, Brother had completed his professional studies and began his life as a teacher, a loyal confrere, a congregational leader, and, most importantly, his life as Xaverian Brother.

Brother Ivo was a teacher and administrator at Saint Joseph School in Heist on the North Sea and at Saint Leo's in Zedelgem. Brother served in congregational leadership. He was elected Provincial of the then Belgian Province in 1980 and was a member of the General Council. Brother Ivo was the last provincial before the province became a region under the Generalate. He also served for many years as regional coordinator until his health prevented it.

Under his leadership great strides were made in the formation program of our Congolese



Brother Ivo always treated his Brothers with patience, kindness and respect no matter how difficult the individual might be. He was very willing to endure all things with a patient smile.

Brothers. Brother Ivo made sure that religious formation was an essential part of university studies. For many years, Brother Ivo was the Congregation's representative to the Belgian government for the schools that were operated by the Brothers. He made a substantive contribution to the presence of Catholic education in West Flanders. Brother Ivo's greatest contribution was to the life of his fellow Xaverians. Brother Ivo always treated his Brothers with patience, kindness and respect no matter how difficult the individual might be. He was very willing to endure all things with a patient smile.

Brother Ivo's love of Christ and the Congregation enabled him to affirm his confreres in their gifts and to help them experience the love of God. As a son of Ryken, Brother Ivo knew the Founder insisted that the 'heart of our Xaverian life is communion with the living God.' (Fundamental Principles paraphrased)

Brother Ivo now knows that 'love never fails.' May Brother Ivo experience the peace of Christ promised to all good and faithful servants.
